Annual General Meeting Report - 23rd January 2023

This year again the AGM was well attended - it must be the draw of free tea and biscuits.

The report that was given for those that could not attend was as follows:

In 2022 the total hours worked at the cemetery was 617.5 plus 100's more in research. The previous year was 712.5 this decrease was due to in 2021 we managed to complete the transcribing of all the headstones.

Membership continues to rise, 2020 had 54, 2021 had 75 and 2022 had 82 members and 5 corporate members.



A big thank you to Sally and Linda for their hard work with the planters beside the chapel, especially considering the hot weather.



We borrowed this Weed Wacker machine from Trowbridge Town Council which allowed us to clear the path edges around the cemetery of the ever spreading weeds and grass. In some areas, as much as six inches of the paths were cleared back.



Our group makes such a difference. This can be seen by the before and after pictures above.


In 2022 we completed painting the cemetery exit gates. Now the front side and back are completed.



We trialled painting grave row makers on the curbs of the paths in order to make it easier to identify a particular grave. This approach seems to work, with the marking surviving the winter weather, so we will be expanding this project over the coming year.

Looking Forward to 2023

Several of the headstones and curbs are in need of moving to their correct positions, tidying or turning over. With this lifting rig which was purchased with a grant from Trowbridge town council, we should be able to start this process.



A new idea for this year will be to try and tackle the ever-growing problem of weeds, brambles, and sapling trees in graves. We will use the map shown to only work on a section at a time until completed. We will be looking to work as a team with a group moving forward cutting saplings, then followed by a group strimming then followed behind by a group gathering the cut down vegetation and taking it to the curb side. We will also cut down overhanging branches and trim bases of trees.

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Nature's Corner

Green Woodpecker *Picus Viridis*

Description

Recognised by the bright green upper parts, rich crimson crown to middle nape, greyish green under parts, black patch on either side of head, yellow rump, and black tail with greenish bars. Adults grow to a length of around 30cm with a 40cm wingspan. Weigh around 180g with a lifespan of between 5 to 10 years.



Distribution

The green woodpecker is a widespread resident but is not found in Ireland and the very north of Scotland. It lives all year round in or around broadleaved mixed woodland and heath like places with bushes and clumps of trees. It regularly feeds on large lawns and other open grassy areas.



Nesting

It bores a hole into a tree trunk with the hole descending about a foot below the entrance, to an enlarged and rounded bottom. No nesting material is used. They usually lay 5-6 eggs between May and June. Incubation takes 18-19 days and is shared by both sexes. They only have one brood per year.

Food

Eats ants, ant eggs, larvae, millipedes, beetles and occasionally worms, using its long sticky tongue to probe nests.

Nature's Corner

Common Earwig *Forficula Auricularia*

There are over 2,000 known species of earwig worldwide, but only four are native to the UK. The main one is the common Earwig. The name comes from the old English for Ear Beetle.

The Common Earwig is mainly nocturnal, scavenging on dead plant material, animal matter, lichens, pollen, and other arthropods, and retreating to hide under stones or in rotten logs during the day.

The Common Earwig is about 13mm long, reddish brown in colour with a flattened and elongated body and slender beaded antennae, an obvious feature of earwigs is the pair of pincers or forces at the tip of the flexible abdomen. Both sexes have these pincers, in males they are large and strongly curved, whereas in females they are straight. Although they do have wings, they are usually reluctant to use them.

Female Common Earwigs are excellent mother laying their eggs in damp crevices, they guard the nest and gently clean the eggs, of which there can be between 30 and 50, until the young hatch.

After the larvae hatch, they undergo a type of development known as incomplete metamorphosis, in which the nymphs process through a series of moults. The stages between moults are known as instars. The females will have lost her maternal instincts when the nymphs reach their second instar. If they have not left the nest by this time they risk being eaten by their mother.

The nymphs are similar to the adults in appearance but their wings are either absent or very small. The average life span of the common earwig is around one year.



Contrary to old myths about earwigs, they do not crawl in people's ears. The tale of earwigs is that they would enter people through their ears and burrow themselves into the brain where they would lay their eggs. This however is not scientifically backed and holds no truth, as earwigs do not have an interest in crawling in people's ears.

Annual General Meeting report (continued)



We have planted the orchard (between the lodge and Brown Mausoleum) and will be looking at an official unveiling of the plaques sometime in the spring. We will also need to mulch and water the trees over the summer months (volunteers needed).



Over the summer we will check the structural integrity of the Rodway mausoleum before we start to clear the vegetation, from on and around the structure. When completed, we will look at having the building surveyed to determine how we should approach its restoration.

We have come to a point where the database that we use to store all burial information is no longer suitable for purpose, so this year we will look to turn this into an online database. The cost of the site is not an issue, but the real problem is the ongoing cost of running and maintaining it. We may look at sponsorship to do this.

We then briefly spoke about wildlife and newsletters, which I have covered in the chairman's ramblings.

The meeting was then brought to a close.
